Attendance

All students are expected to be sitting at Assembly at 9am every morning. Students who are late to school miss important messages and settling routines in their classrooms. What's happening in Stage 2?

EAL/C

Our Journey to Australia was discussed in Stage 2 EAL/D. Students arrived in Australia from-Syria, India, Pakistan, Malaysia, Bangladesh and Iraq. Students mapped their journeys and all of the students revealed they came by plane.





3W

This term, stage 2 place great emphasis on the importance of reading as they test reading and comprehension skills within small groups with their teacher. Reading groups also encourage other aspects of reading and comprehension abilities as each student completes a number of activities during their rotations. Rotation activities include: Spelling grid, reciprocal reading, reading and activities, handwriting, journal writing, as well as activities that incorporate ict including studyladder, spelling city and kids news.

<u>3E</u>

During Mathematics we have been learning about two and three dimensional objects. We spent some time exploring and creating different 3D shapes. We also practised identifying 2D shapes when we played a game called '2D Shape Snap'. We had lots of fun playing this game.



<u>3/4M</u>

In Writing, we have been learning the 7 steps to successfully writing a narrative. So far we have learnt to 'plan for success', write a 'sizzling start', create 'tightening tension', the importance of including 'dynamic dialogue' and how we can 'show, not tell' through the use of descriptive language.



<u>4H</u>

In History, Stage 2 undertake a guided inquiry into the journeys of one early sea explorer. They undertake a second guided inquiry to investigate the question, 'Who discovered Australia?'. They use early maps and journals held in the digital collections of Australian museums. Students have the option of undertaking a student-led inquiry into an early explorer. This can replace the first guided inquiry.

<u>4CG</u>

In Science, Stage 2 have been comparing the features and characteristics of living things. We have been comparing the life cycles of living things to discover what all living things need to survive. We have also been designing scientific investigations to find out more about the relationship between living things and the environment.

Did you know?

All living things need air, water, energy and shelter to survive. Humans get our energy from food and plants receive their energy from the sun. Shelter could be a house for a human, a nest for a bird or soil for a plant.
