Road Safety




We know that it might be convenient to let children out of the car while you are stopped at the pedestrian crossing it is extremely

Overseas Travel

Selective High School 2024

Selective High Schools carer for academically gifted students with high potential who may otherwise be without sufficient classmates at their own academic standard at a regular High School. Selective High Schools help these students to learn by grouping them with students of similar ability and by using specialised teaching methods.

If you would like to have your Year 5 child considered for Year 7 Selective High School entry in 2024 you must apply online using a valid email address. This cannot be the student's email address. Detailed instructions on how to apply and the link to the online form can be found at https://education.nsw.gov.au/public-schools/selective-high-schools-and-opportunity-classes/year-7

Applications close on 16th November. The Selective High School Test will be held on 4 May 2023.

COVID Smart Updates

Children Must Be Picked Up At 3pm

The school day ends at 3pm. All students must be picked up at 3pm. Thank you to the families who are always on time to pick up their children at 3pm. Teachers are not on duty to supervise students who are not picked up on time. They have work to do in their classrooms to prepare for the next day or they are involved in meetings after school.

Occasionally parents are held up and are late to pick up their child. We understand this but ask that if you are going to be late that you contact the office before 2.45pm. This allows the office time to get a message to your child's teacher.



Unfortunately some students are regularly not picked up at 3pm. There is a handful of students who are picked up by carers / educators who are regularly late. This is not acceptable.

The school will make contact with families who are late to pick up their children on a regular basis. If this continues a report may be made to the Department of Education's Home School Liaison Officer (HSLO).
